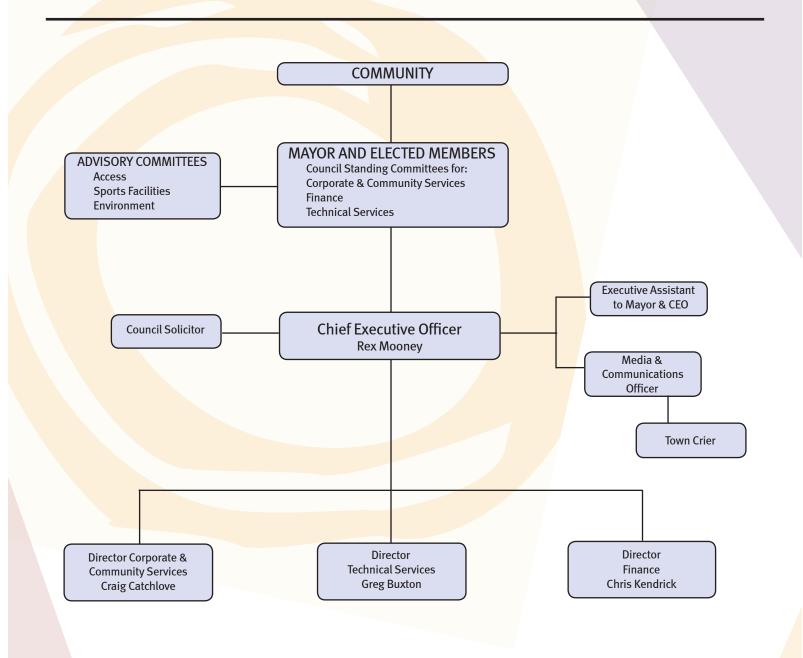

Alice Springs Town Council 2007-2008 Organisational Structure

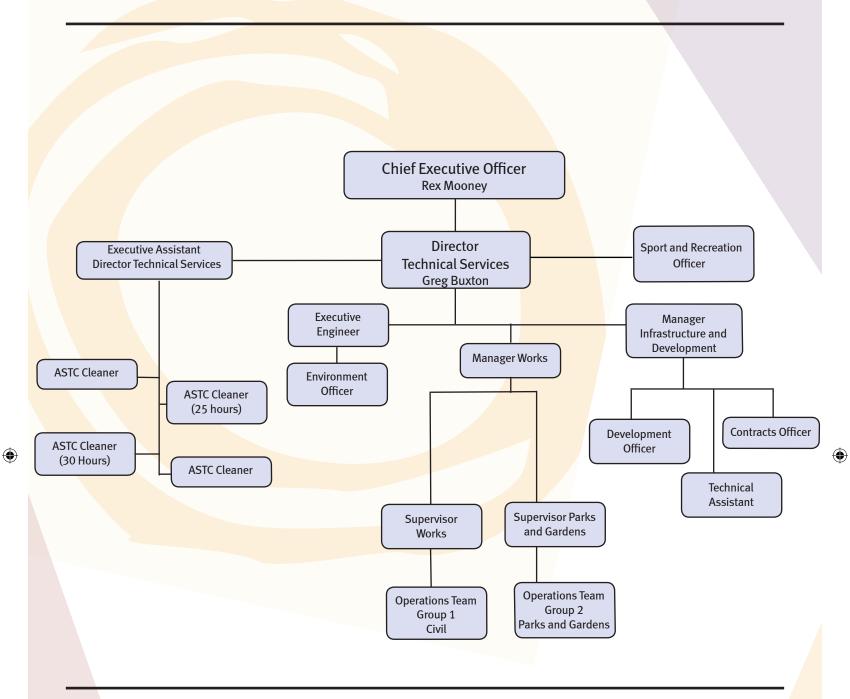


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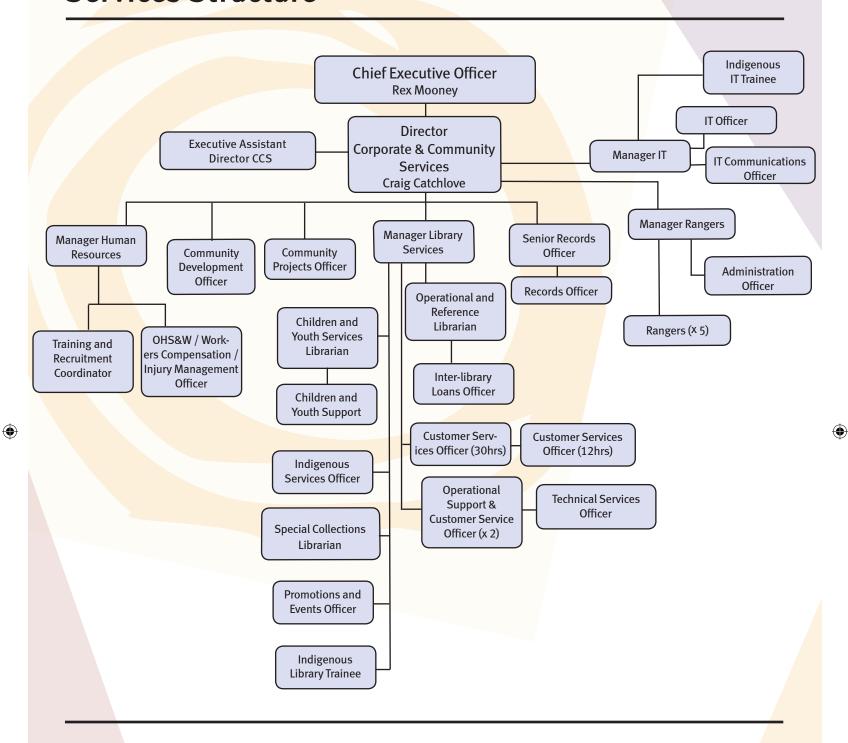


Alice Springs Town Council 2007-2008 Technical Services Structure



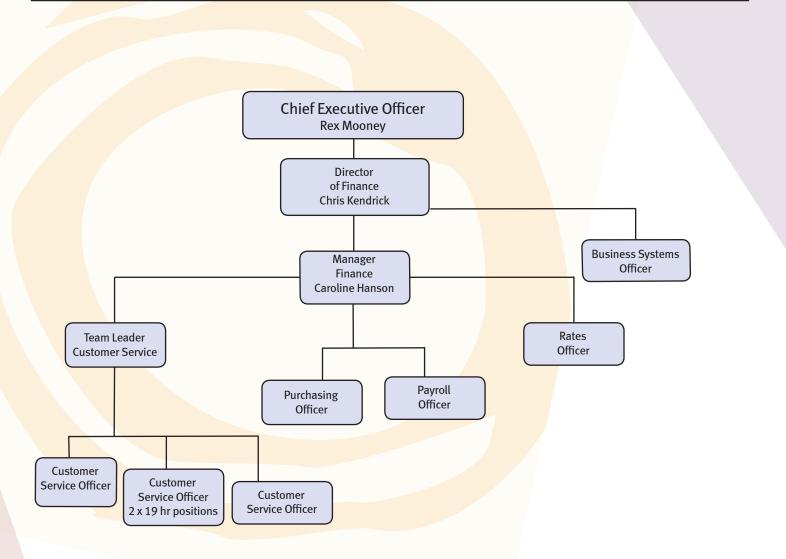


Alice Springs Town Council 2007-2008 Corporate and Community Services Structure

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1. ECONOMIC

GOAL: A growing and dynamic economic base underpinning strong employment

Solar Energy: a force to be reckoned with

The excitement was evident on Monday 10th March 2008, as 400 Alice Springs residents cheered when Federal Environment Minister Peter Garrett launched Alice Solar City.

The \$37 million, six year project is part of the Australian Government's Solar Cities initiative and aims to explore how technology, behavioural change and new



approaches to electricity pricing can combine to provide a sustainable energy future for Australia. Elements include residential, commercial and large scale solar trials.

The Alice Springs Solar City Consortium represents broad community support, with the Alice Springs Town Council as lead agent. In the six months since its launch, over 350 residents have signed up to be part of Alice Solar City and General Manager Brian Elmer says he has been greatly encouraged by the interest so far. "Our recent research has shown that over 70% of Alice Springs residents believe that it is up to the individual to make a difference."

Solar Cities are working to a target of completing 600 energy surveys over the next year and are well on their way to achieving that goal. Residents can visit the Smart Living Centre on Todd Street to sign up for a free home energy survey, after which they will receive a personalized energy saving report. They can then choose from a range of financial incentives to assist them on their way to becoming an energy champion.

There are incentive vouchers for activities such as painting the roof white, servicing evaporative air-conditioners, and installing efficient lighting, tinted windows, double glazing or insulation.

There are also incentives to install residential photovoltaic (PV) solar electricity systems, solar hot water systems, and smart meters to monitor household energy use.

Incentive vouchers to the value of \$350,000 have been issued to participants so far – if every resident actions their vouchers, this will inject over \$1 million to the local economy.

On 29 May 2008, the Alice Solar City Commercial Services program was launched. Alice Springs businesses can now access incentives to assist in reducing their energy consumption. Energy incentives range from \$5000 to \$50,000 to help business owners install energy efficient measures such as lighting upgrades, insulation and solar hot water systems.

The commercial and public sectors are integral to the success of Alice Solar City, as they consume over 50% of Alice Springs' power. Businesses are able to take advantage of a free walk-through energy survey at their commercial premises, to identify and discuss energy efficiency opportunities They can then receive a tailored energy saving report.



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Community Events: An Economic Plus

Council is a proud supporter of key community events unique to Alice Springs. Throughout the 2007/08 financial year Council provided fundamental support to a number of valuable local events through cash assistance and in-kind support.

These events bring thousands of tourists to Central Australia annually, and significantly boost the local economy. Council's Tourism, Promotions and Events Committee continues to review and make recommendations back to Council regarding event support and sponsorship requests.

Key events supported and committed to during the 2007/08 financial year include:

Conferences of Benefit

Council has been proud to support and underpin several important conferences in Central Australia throughout the previous year, and is committed to aiding in future significant events.

Conference delegates and organisers contribute positively to the Alice Springs community and economy, and key strategic events continue to showcase Central Australia on a national and international level.

Key conferences supported by Council include the June 2008 launch of General Network Practice Network NT, with further support planned in the 2008/09 year through the August 2008 Art at the Heart Regional Arts Australia Conference, and September 2008 Australian Library and Information Association's Biennial Conference 'Dreamin 08', hosted by the Alice Springs Public Library.

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Council Welcomes Tiger Airlines

Alice Springs Town Council welcomed the news from low-cost flight carrier Tiger Airlines when they announced that Alice Springs will have access to three direct lunch time flights to Melbourne starting in December 2007.

Alice Springs Town Council has had a long term vision to see the number of interstate and international airline passengers to and from Alice Springs increase, and Tiger Airlines commitment to the community is a step in the right direction.

"For a long time Council has felt that Alice Springs would be an ideal home for Tiger Airlines, as it is about two hours from all major cities and we don't have the night time traffic curiews that exist in the Eastern states," said former Mayor Fran Kilgariff.

"Hopefully we will see an increase in visitors to Alice Springs and Central Australia through the new flights, which in turn will obviously help boost the overall economy of the entire community," said former Mayor Kilgariff.

"Tiger Airlines' flights from Alice Springs to Melbourne will also be of great benefit to people in our community who will now have access to competitive flight prices to Melbourne," said Mayor Kilgariff.

In the year preceding the announcement Alice Springs Town Council representatives met regularly with the Alice Springs Airport representatives and Government representatives assigned to increase airline passenger numbers to the NT to work toward this common goal.

"This is a positive outcome for all parties involved, and shows the strength Government and non-government partnerships that work for the benefit of the entire community," said former Mayor Kilgariff.

Since the successful uptake of its initial Alice Springs-Melbourne flights, Tiger Airlines has announced plans to introduce flights between Adelaide and Alice Springs from March 2009.

Development Consent Authority: Council asks for Change

On Thursday 5 June 2008 Mayor Damien Ryan publicly announced the Alice Springs Town Council's desire to change arrangements relating to ASTC nominated DCA representatives, at a Planning Forum held in Central Australia.

The Development Consent Authority (DCA) is established under section 82 of the Planning Act. Further details can be found on the NT Government website, including meeting dates and current members. Currently, the Alice Springs Town Council nominates two members, and one alternate, to sit on the DCA, but representatives are recognised as individuals. Council is seeking to change these arrangements so that nominees for the DCA are formally recognised as Alice Springs Town Council representatives.

The aim is to facilitate free discussion between the DCA and Alice Springs Town Council. Council has no other strategic planning role except the DCA, and Mayor Damien Ryan utilised the Planning Forum to highlight the importance of this function. "The Mayor and Alice Springs Town Council are seeking amendments that will allow representatives to take messages from council to the DCA forum and for messages from the DCA to flow back to Council," said Chief Executive Officer Rex Mooney.

Youth Forum

Mayor Damien Ryan and the Alice Springs Town Council held a Youth Forum on Tuesday 17th June 2008, from 9.00am – 3.00pm, at the Council Civic Centre on Todd Street.

Youth from all over the Alice Springs region were nvited to attend through their schools, organisations, contacts, and various clubs and groups. The aim was to facilitate friendly discussions with youth who represent a broad spectrum of the community.

Council believes that to successfully implement plans for young people, they must operate through the minds of young people themselves.

The forum included group discussion, small group 'breakout' sessions, a town planning

debate, and time for small group reports and whole group feedback. The Youth Forum's facilitator, Coralie Boyd, then compiled a report summarising the main activities and discussion topics for the day, which was submitted to Council for consideration.







Vibrant Night Markets

The Alice Springs Town Council holds monthly Night Markets from August - December each year, culminating in the lively Christmas Carnival. The markets feature stallholders from all walks of life - from local businesses to community groups, sports clubs, church groups, buskers, and budding entrepeneurs.

Vibrant Night Markets are a free family-friendly community event, always packed with activities and live entertainment for people of all ages. The Markets are held in the Todd Mall from 5 - 9pm on one Thursday night of each month in the second half of the year, until the Christmas Carnvial, which is held on a Friday night in mid-December.

Every year the Christmas Carnival gives the entire community the chance to come together and celebrate the festive season, and the 2007 event promoted peace and tolerance among Alice Springs residents and visitors. Each year sees new and exciting adventures in the dedicated Children's area, with the innovative 'Wacky Hairdo' offer at the 2007 Carnival proving extremely popular among pint-sized residents - and set for production expansion at the 2008 event.



"An Invitation for Change" Community Awareness Campaign

On Sunday 29 July the community awareness campaign "An invitation for change" was launched on local television. The campaign ran for several months and invited everyone to play a part in creating positive changes for Alice Springs. The development of the campaign followed a firm commitment made by the Alice Springs Town Council at a Community Leaders Forum held in May 2007, and was subsequently backed by the support of the NT Government and Imparja Television.



"The campaign is being released in conjunction with the NT Government's rollout of the Dry Town Legislation, however our campaign focuses more on the need for everyone to respect our town and take responsibility for community safety Alice Springs," said former Mayor Fran Kilgariff. The campaign included a series of three 30 second commercials, aimed at engaging with a large cross-section of the Alice Springs community - both residents and visitors.

Council also ran a simultaneous radio campaign in remote communities to reiterate the key messages from the television campaign. Key spokespeople in the advertisements included former Mayor Fran Kilgariff, Aboriginal Community Police Officer Phillip Alice and popular local band "The Moxie".

Library the Place for 'Happy Little Vegemites'

The Alice Springs Public Library will be part of the new early childhood initiative called the Vegemite Little Aussie Reader Program. Parents and caregivers of children up to five years old can visit the library and pick up a unique Vegemite Little Aussie Reader Scrapbook free of charge.

The interactive resource is designed to help and encourage parents to read aloud to their children from infancy. The Alice Springs Public Library hopes Alice Springs families will make sure they take the time to come in and collect this free and useful resource.

"Some of the things parents will find in the free Vegemite Little Aussie Reader Scrapbook include tips on reading aloud to children, age appropriate book lists to help parents select books, sections to record family memories and words and actions to nursery rhymes, clapping and action songs," said former Mayor Fran Kilgariff.

The initiative is being supported by 1700 public libraries across Australia, and over 360,000 scrap books have been distributed nationally. Participating libraries and child care centres will also receive other resources on topics including language development, reading aloud, suggested activities based on books as well as additional online information each month.

The development of the Vegemite Little Aussie Reader program has been assisted by the Australian Government through the Australia for the Arts, as well as being enthusiastically supported by the Northern Territory Public Library and the Public Libraries networks.

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Alice Springs Town Council encouraged the community to "get on their bikes" and take part in the first ever National Ride to Work Day on Wednesday 17 October 2007. Council hosted a free breakfast from 6.30am to 9am on the day to celebrate.

The free Ride to Work Day community breakfast was held on the Civic Centre lawns on the corner of Stott Terrace and Todd Street for all participants in Australia's biggest active workplace event.

This included a live radio broadcast from ABC radio's Stewart Brash, the host of the Breakfast Show. There was also information and stalls on cycling safety and healthy lifestyles for people to access through the Alice Springs Cycling Club, the Baker Heart Research Institute and local bike shop displays.

Both regular and first-time riders in Alice Springs were urged to join the first National Ride to Work Day, and make sure they use pedal power to get to work. Council promotes cycling as a healthy, efficient and cost effective way to get to work.

Council encouraged everyone to get together with their colleagues and ride to work as a team, or meet at the event to enjoy the healthy breakfast in a social environment. Not only will increased cycling create a healthy, active and social community, it will also provide environmental benefits for the whole town.

The event, which was a combined project of the Alice Springs Town Council and the Alice Springs Cycling Reference group members, was all about encouraging cycling in the community.

Alice Springs Town Council will also launched the release of a new brochure "Cycling in Alice Springs – a community guide to cycling safety and sharing our roads". The brochure highlights cycling benefits, with Alice Springs specific data as well as information on the responsibilities of cyclists and motorists when sharing the roads.

Alice Springs Town Council is proud to support the ever-growing cycling community, and is thankful to all those who partnered with Council to bring this event to life.





Changes in place to deal with abandoned vehicles

In 2007 the Alice Springs Town Council reviewed its removal of abandoned vehicles procedures, following recent fire damage caused to abandoned vehicles in Alice Springs.

The new procedures are based on strict compliance with Territory Traffic Regulations and it is hoped that earlier removal of abandoned vehicles will prevent subsequent damage from occuring.

All vehicles that are left in hazardous places or deemed to be illegally parked, whether they be registered or unregistered, are now immediately removed.

Previously all registered vehicles not left in a hazardous area, regardless of whether they were parked legally or not, were given a lengthy seven day grace period, and unregistered vehicles were given 24 hours.

Under the amended procedures, a legally parked registered vehicle can still remain there for seven days before removal, however an illegally parked registered vehicle will now be given a 24 hour grace period in accordance with Territory Traffic Regulations, instead of the former seven days.



Another major change means any unregistered vehicle, regardless of whether it is legally or illegally parked, will now be removed immediately.

Council felt earlier removal practices would lessen the damage done to cars left in public spaces, and would decrease the detrimental effect this type of vandalism can have on the perceptions of both residents and visitors.

The changes also mean that

owners of vehicles left in public spaces can be spared major financial losses if their vehicle were otherwise subject to vandalism and arson.

The reneweed abandoned vehicles procedures continue to be effectively enforced by Council's Ranger team, part the Corporate and Community Services department.

Council continues to charge a release fee to owners of impounded vehicles, which goes toward recovering towing costs involved with the removal of the abandoned vehicle.

Community Insight into Local Government

Since October 2007, the Alice Springs Town Council has given the entire community the opportunity to gain an insight into Local Government by making sound recordings of each Council and Committee meeting available for download through Council's website.

The recordings have been made available for download through the use of innovative recording technology in the new Civic Centre Chamber, and mean people can access the recordings in their own time. Recordings are publicly accessible within 48 hours of a meeting for around two months.

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Aquatic Centre: Making a Splash

Stage 1 of the Aquatic and Leisure Centre works, the outdoor components, will be ready for the 2008/09 Alice Springs swim season, and will play host to hundreds of swimmers competing in

events at the Alice Springs Masters games in

October 2008.

The new Aquatic and Leisure Centre is the largest capital works project ever undertaken by the Alice Springs Town Council. Stage 1 of the construction works includes a new learn-to swim pool, a new paddle pool, and the draining and reviatlisation of the existing outdoor 50 metre pool.

Council's Director Technical Services Greg Buxton is pleased with the project.





"This is the first stage of a three stage program that will deliver Alice Springs an exciting aquatic and leisure centre that will be one of the most modern facilities available in Australia," Mr. Buxton said. He said "It will include many environmental considerations a n d leading edge technology, specifically in plant and filtration systems".

CCTV a Community Success

The installation of CCTV cameras has successfully reduced antisocial behaviour in Todd Mall. A joint initiative between the Alice Springs Town Council, NT Police, and the NT Government, the CCTV camera surveillance system has been in operation for nearly six months.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Rex Mooney said the CCTV system had proven a success. "Antisocial behaviour has decreased throughout the Mall since the installation of the CCTV system," Mr Mooney said. "The proven success of this system has prompted Council to approach the NT Government for funding to increase the current network," Mr Mooney said.

The CCTV camera surveillance system has been in operation since April 2008.

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3. Environment

Cash for Cans: a Recycling Success

From Monday 29 October - Thursday 20 December the people of Alice Springs enthusiastically recycled cans, thanks to a program run by the Alice Springs Town Council.

Centralians were able to bring in their cans for recycling at 5 cents each, as a result of Alice Springs Town Council receiving a \$10,000 grant through the EnvironmeNT Grants Programme to undertake a can recycling programme. The program was extended via another \$10,000 cash injection from Council's own funds.

This initiative was part of a waste management and resource recovery

program being initiated by Council. Territory Metals provided collection bales and collected them from Council once they were full. Alice Springs Town Council has looked into various ways to encourage recycling in Alice Springs over the years, and the receipt of this grant has allowed people in the community be rewarded for thinking green.

Since the Cash for Cans initiative was a one off funding grant, the recycling could only continue for as long as the grant money would allow. Council received \$1.00 per kilogram for the cans during the project, and this money was injected back into the program to keep it running as long as possible.

The programme received great community support, and Council extends its thanks and appreciation to everyone in Alice Springs who became involved in the project. The positive feedback received and the community support for the can recycling program was been overwhelming. "Every day people were bringing in their cans – sometimes only a few at a time, and other times up to 500 at a time. At the beginning of December, over \$16,500 had been paid out in can refunds to the community," said former Mayor Kilgariff.

Waste Management

Council continued to provide a weekly domestic refuse collection service to all ratepayers within the rural, residential, commercial and industrial areas. To complement that service Council provides two pruning removal service rounds per year for aged pensioners. This is a free service for pensioners who would like green waste and prunings removed from their properties. Council also provide free residential green waste drop off at its Landfill site on Commanage Road, available to Alice Springs residents at any time during the landfill's operational hours.

Council continue to provide a free domestic hazardous waste drop off on the first Sunday of every month between 10am and 2pm. The drop off is located at the hazardous waste compound near the weighbridge on Commanage Road. Residents can dispose of up to five litres of oil and small domestic quantities of insecticides, weed killers and other hazardous chemicals.

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The 2007 National Tree Day was being celebrated in Alice Springs on Sunday 29 July. Alice Springs Town Council together with local organiser and major sponsor, Peter Kittle Motor Company, supported the event and encouraged willing volunteers to come down on the day and help do their part for the environment.

"This year 500 native trees and shrubs will be planted at Finlayson Park off of Finlayson Street with the aim of beautifying, revegetating and providing shade in this popular local park," said former Mayor Kilgariff. Alice Springs Town Council supported National Tree Day by supplying the 500 native trees and shrubs, irrigation supplies, mulch and Council staff to prepare the site long before the day, and remain on hand and helping out throughout the event.

"Alice Springs Town Council is always proud to support National Tree Day. Planting native trees in Alice Springs is a great way to ensure that adequate habitat is provided for our native wildlife," said former Mayor Kilgariff.

There is a major emphasis being placed on the preservation and protection of our environment at a global scale, and National Tree Day forms part of this effort. It's also an important way that residents can contribute to the environment and help fight climate change at a community level.

The day included entertainment for children, with Yamba the Honey Ant, Ima Safety House, balloons and face painting, aimed at making National Tree Day in Alice Springs an enjoyable activity for the whole family. Refreshments and a free BBQ were also provided, along with all equipment required for volunteers there to help plant trees.



Community keen to help "Clean Up"

Every year hundreds of thousands of Australians take part in Clean Up Australia Day, and the Alice Springs Town Council encouraged the community to join in on Sunday 2 March 2008.

Council waived fees for participants in Clean Up Australia Day to deliver domestic and green waste at the Alice Springs Landfill and Green Waste Processing Facility on Commonage Road.

Many community members used this as an incentive to get out in the community and be a part of Clean Up Australia Day in Alice Springs. Clean Up Australia Day is firmly entrenched in the Alice Springs calendar. It is an apolitical, non-profit community campaign in which everyone can participate.

Cemeteries

Council maintains three cemeteries, the Stuart Memorial Cemetery, the Memorial Cemetery (both of which are closed) and the Garden Cemetery, an attractive Cemetery on the southern outskirts of the town, and the only cemetery currently in use.

The Alice Springs Garden Cemetery offers a range of interment options including lawn sections, general traditional, niche wall, rose gardens and native garden areas.

New Vacuum Sweeper Excels

Council has made sure the new mini-LitterBoss vacuum sweeper sees its fair share of action. First put to use in February 2007, the new machine was purchased to help cope with the notable

increase in glass and litter since the introduction of the Alice Springs Liquor Supply Plan.

The mini-LitterBoss vacuum sweeper is different to other street and path sweepers, which can only brush debris such as litter and glass to the side of paths, because it actually sweeps material underneath the machine and vacuums it up into a collection hopper.

The decision to purchase the new machine came after public safety issues became a growing Council and community concern surrounding the increase in glass on Alice Springs paths and in public spaces.

It is obviously a very versatile machine, and Council is very pleased with the investment. As well as serving its primary purpose on our paths, it has also proven

useful for cleaning up parks, ovals and facilities after major functions and events.

The LitterBoss is a very compact machine, and picks up materials such broken glass, soda cans, cigarette butts and leaves without difficulty from sidewalks, curbs, bicycle paths and parking lots.

Council is very pleased be able to share this machine with the community, and is proud to continue leading the way in innovative and effective measures to deal with the environment all community members share.



Environmental Expenditure Increased

Council's Business Plan, for a four year period, was prepared during the final months of the 2008 financial year. The Plan was prepared with reference to Council's overall strategic plan and goals, the maintenance of core services, and recommendations received from the community, Aldermen, and Officers.

Elected members of the 11th Alice Springs Town Council felt strongly that a responsible budget which embraced forward planning and environmental initiatives would pave the way to successfully serving Alice Springs community.

The Business Plan provides budget estimates that will deliver a wide range of services to the Alice Springs community, including new environmental initiatives like the Alice Solar Cities project and Council's landfill site, where expenditure has increased by \$400K, to \$1.2 million. In excess of \$100K is also planned for additional tree maintenance and planting.

Council remains dedicated to the Alice Springs community, and is thinking smart to provide for a bright future. This will be assisted by the addition of \$395K to the \$620K reserve currently held to provide for the rehabilitation and establishment of a new landfill in approximately 15 years time – at an estimated cost of \$10 million.

Upgraded: Recreational Environments

Alice Springs is an active community and has sports and activitiy participation rates among the highest in the country. While our sporting complexes are second to none, Council is also committed to ensuring residents have access to appropriate recreational and relaxation areas, and has been working across town upgrading public parks and spaces.

Community consultation is a priority when designing public spaces, and Council continues to work with resident groups to improve parks and provide low-maintenance recreation areas that can be enjoyed throughout the year.









Road Maintenance

The ongoing challenge of maintaining a good quality local road network throughout Central Australia is an expensive task.

The total area of the Alice Springs municipality is 327 square kms and Council maintains approximately 248 kilometres of roadway within that area. Of Council's roads, 229km kilometres of roads are sealed roads and 19km kilometres are unsealed. Road lengths increase each year as new subdivisions are created.

The current asset value of Council's road network is approximately \$56,280,000. Council's development and maintenance expenditure during the financial year was as follows:

- Road Maintenance \$250,000
- Road Reserve Development & Maintenance \$75,000
- Roads to Recovery \$71,000
- Footpath Development & Maintenance \$53,000 (includes cycle tracks)
- Traffic Lights Maintenance \$41,000







3. CULTURE & HERITAGE

GOAL: A community proud of its Indigenous heritage and pioneer history

Gathering Garden set to delight

The Alice Springs Town Council has been successful in its application to the NT Government for a Public Art Major Works Grant to fund the new public art project at the Civic Centre, submitted 14 March 2008.

The Gathering Garden is a major public art project that will see local visions come alive as the large barren corner where Todd Street and Gregory Terrace connect in the Alice Springs CBD becomes an engaging public space for all to enjoy.

The NT Government Grant will match the Alice Springs Town Council's spending of \$150,000 on the *Gathering Garden* project dollar for dollar, making total expenditure \$300,000.

This is the first public art project developed by Council since it adopted its public art policy and formed the Public Art Advisory Committee.

The Gathering Garden was the result of an Australia- wide call for expressions of interest and although the project's coordinator is from Melbourne, all contributions have been and will be from locals.

The three dimensional environmental installation will include 450 plants, 9 bronze coolamon, walkways, and a central water feature. It is based on a painting by Marie Elena Ellis and Roseanne Ellis that pays homage to the Arrente land as well as those who once inhabited the site, such as the Afghan cameleers and Miss Olive Pink.

The project was developed in cross cultural collaboration and has considered artistic and community cultural development practices at different stages of the projects development. Site layout and actions will involve an

interactive and shared creative process in coming months, and Council is proud to continue supporting the works.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Mr Rex Mooney said he anticipates that this public art project will result in the provision of a new and significant area for Alice Springs residents and visitors to enjoy. "This is an important public domain," Mr. Mooney said. Visible work on the site will begin early in the 2008/09 year.



Art at the Heart

Art at the Heart is the biennial Regional Arts Australia Conference, held in Alice Springs in 2008, and attracting over 900 delegates from around Australia and overseas.

Council is very pleased to be involved with and offer support to community arts and events of all varieties, and were thrilled to be named host town for such an anticipated and innovative event.

Art at the Heart provided a great opportunity to come together and celebrate our creativeness and diversity, while exploring new and viable opportunities for art and expression within our communities.

Creativity, expression and sharing are ingrained and valuable human traits, and are very important in helping us all to connect ourselves to our surroundings. They help to give us a sense of place and identity.

Council is grateful for the opportunities and exposure the part conference/part festival event will bring to art and the creative industries throughout Alice Springs and Central Australia, and fully supports the Art at the Heart event through a range of in-kind assistance opportunities.

Kathleen Wallace, a regarded elder and artist of international renown, famous in Central Australia for her story-telling and teaching, and who designed and painted ASTC's very own Mayoral robes, played a key role in the Art at the Heart preparations and program launch.

Cultural Protocols – Bins Project

As part of the Cultural Protocols Project, Alice Springs Town Council and traditional owners Lhere Artepe Aboriginal Corporation (LAAC) worked together in the Bins in Mall Project. The bins have been installed in the Alice Springs CBD.

It is hoped that when Indigenous people from communities out of town come to Alic eSprings and see these bins they will recognise, understand and respect the traditional owners authority to speak for this country.

It is hoped the bins will provide a sense of ownership, demonstrating that beneath the buildings and the streets lay the traditional owners country and place.

LAAC look forward to them visiting, seeing their stories and respecting their home.



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Giving Knowledge: A Continuing Initiative

The Alice Springs Public Library has a lot to be proud of. It leads the way in encouraging Indigenous usage, and continues to promote cross cultural understanding.

Recent years have seen positive moves by Council and Library staff to encourage and actively support Indigenous people to access and use Library services more productively.

Indigenous Library patrons were surveyed in 2002 to increase Council understanding of needs and wants for this user group. As a result, the 'Akaltye Antheme' Collection was established.

'Akaltye Antheme' is Arrernte and means 'Giving Knowledge'.

Council's Indigenous Services Officer Sylvia Neale has been a strong advocate for the new Collection of Local Indigenous Languages, to augment the Akaltye Antheme.

This Collection aims to promote literacy in the languages spoken locally in Central Australia, for indigenous and non-indigenous patrons alike.

In 2007 Council allocated funds that enabled the Library's Special Collections Librarian Fional Blackburn to purchase a variety of local language resources.

Most were sourced from local organisations like Batchelor Press, IAD Press, Yipirinya School and Yuendemu Bilingual Resource Development Unit.

These resources will be available for perusal by all library patrons; and will be used for future Library activities such as bi-lingual story-telling.



The Akaltye Antheme Collection presents Indigenous knowledge in a variety of forms and supports Indigenous family and group access.

One recent addition to the Akaltye Antheme Collection is the Central Land Council archive database, donated by CLC.

This is a photographic archive containing over 5000 photographs, and depicts the histories of activities held by the CLC since the 1960's.





5. ORGANISATION

GOAL: An Organisation Dedicated to Good Governance, Effective Leadership and Provision of High Quality Services.

Our people, our staff

Alice Springs Town Council remains one of the largest employers in Alice Springs, and offers some of the best employment conditions available. Over 60 positions were filled during the 07/08 financial year, and Council has achieved an indigenous employment rate of around 14%.

Alice Springs Town Council is committed to learning and development, and as such organised over 25 training courses for over 200 participants in a variety of areas including computer skills, machinery licenses, cultural awareness, customer service and OH&S procedures.

Council also maintained its Employee Recognition Program in 07/08, and also continued to recognise the efforts and milestones of long term staff.



Crafting a Workforce

Council aims to retain a high quality work force. As an employer, Council proudly recognises personal achievements and provides pathways to training and skills upgrades.

As an innovative approach to skills creation an quality staff management, Council identified and successfully filled a number of trainee and apprenticeship positions during the 2007/08 financial year.

This includes a Mechanical Apprentice, employed since January 2008; an Indigenous Library Trainee, employed since February 2008; a Horticultural Trainee, employed since March 2008, and more recently, an Indigenous IT Trainee and an Indigenous Corporate and Community Services Trainee.

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Staff Induction

Council has a c o m p r e h e n s i v e induction process to aid all new staff in a smooth transition to their workplace. This includes basic facilities toursm, introductions to all other staff members, job-specific equipment set-up, and a seat at the next Council Induction Day.

Organised by Council's Recruitment and Training Officer, the Council Induction Days are held every few months and aim to present new staff with



information on their role within the context of the wider organisation, and of the entire organisation's role within the community.

Induction Day's feature presentations from the Chief Executive Officer, Media and Communications Officer, Director Technical Services, Director Finance, and Director Corporate and Community Services, as well as the Human Resources Manager.

Staff also participate in a cultural awareness session presented by local cultural awareness experts. These sessions aim to contextualise cultural issues within Alice Springs, and familiarise new employees with Council and community cultural issues and arrangements. These sessions are of particular importance for new employees from interstate, and provide a basic understanding of the history and existing cultural practices throughout Central Australia.

Freedom of Information

The Northern Territory Information Act applies to the Alice Springs Town Council. The Act gives to the general public a right to access information held by Council if it is in the public interest to do so. A person may also apply to access and if necessary correct personal information held by Council.

Under Section 11 of the Act, Council as a public sector organisation must publish a statement about its structure and functions, the kinds of information usually held by it and a description of its procedures for providing access to information and correcting personal information.

Structure and functions

The Alice Springs Town Council is a local government authority established under the Local Government Act. It is charged with the peace order and good government of the municipality of Alice Springs and has the control and management of that government.

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Council's functions are prescribed by the Act and include the control and management of

- Public places
- Street lighting
- On and off street parking
- Markets
- Public transport
- **Public toilets**
- Sanitation and garbage
- Litter and street cleaning
- **Animals**
- Halls and public buildings
- The Alice Springs Swimming Centre
- The Alice Springs Public Library
- Parks, gardens and reserves
- Roads (with some exceptions)
- Cemeteries

Kinds of Information

Broadly speaking, the Alice Springs Town Council holds information falling into the following categories:

- information relating the discharge of its functions; (a)
- (b) information related to inquiries and investigations into complaints against members of the public and Council employees;
- information related to the management of Council including personnel, occupational health and safety, contracts, legal advice, financial records and information about asset management; and
- information related to rates including the information in the rate book kept by Council pursuant (d) to sections 59 and 60 of the Local Government Act.

Pursuant to section 149 of the Local Government Act, any person may inspect the current version of the following documents at Council's office free of charge:

- auditor's report
- Council's policy concerning Elected Members in relation to payment of expenses and provision of facilities
- rate book (but not so as to disclose a ratepayer's history of payment of rates and charges)
- register of interests
- agendas for Council meetings
- a copy of the unconfirmed minutes of each meeting of Council or a committee together with any recommendations and reports referred to in the meeting which are not prescribed as confidential.

The following documents may also be inspected at Council's office or accessed at its website at www.alicesprings.nt.gov.au:

- The previous 6 annual financial statements and annual reports
- Business Plan 2005 2008
- Strategic Plan 2001
- Strategic Plan 2004 2009

Any owner, occupier of mortgagee of land within the municipality of Alice Springs (or a person authorised in writing by any of them), any purchaser or person who proposes to purchase the land or any prospective mortgagee may apply to Council for a certificate under section 223 of the Local Government Act.

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The certificate either sets out the details of any rates, charges or other amounts due and payable to Council in relation to the land or certifies that no rates, charges or other amounts are then due or payable. It also give details of any notices or orders issued by Council for work to be carried out in relation to the land and of the amounts that may be recovered by it from the owner or occupier of the land for work done.

Council charges a fee of \$66 for this certificate.

Accessing Council information

In cases where information sought is not publicly available or cannot be provided by way of a Section 223 certificate, any member of the public may request that information by completing and lodging with Council an Application to Access Council Information. This form is available from Council's office or may be downloaded from its website. A fee of \$30 is charged for receiving this application.

Council's Information Officer must make a decision within 30 days of application whether to grant access to the information sought or to refuse access to the information in whole or in part. If access is granted, a further processing fee may be charged in accordance with the Information Act depending of the nature and extent of the information sought. Photocopying fees may also be charged. A decision to refuse access may only be based on the ground that the information sought is exempt under the Act because to disclose it would be contrary to the public interest. A person aggrieved by a decision to refuse access may apply to Council for a review of the decision. In that case, Council's Director Corporate and Community must conduct a review within 30 days of application. If the person remains aggrieved after the review, he or she may make a complaint to the Information Commissioner.

Accessing and correcting personal information

Any member of the public may access their personal information by completing and lodging with Council an Application for personal information. This form is also available from Council's office or may be downloaded from its website. No fee is charged for receiving or processing an application to access personal information.

If, after accessing their personal information, they consider that the information is wrong, incomplete or out-of-date, they may request that records containing information about them be corrected by completing and lodging with Council an Application to correct personal information.

Council's Information Officer must make a decision within 30 days of application to agree to the request, refuse the request or make different corrections to those requested. A person aggrieved by the decision is entitled to request Council to take reasonable steps to associate with that information a statement by him or her that the information is incorrect. This form is also available from Council's office or may be downloaded from its website. Again, no fee is charged for receiving or processing an application to correct personal information.

A detailed explanation of Council's procedures and requirements in relation to applications to access and correct information may be found in its publication Access to Council Information available at its office or website.

Operating Income and Operating Expenditure

The detailed audited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2008 follow this report.

During the 2007/2008 financial year Council maintained its delivery of core services to the community at a high level. Those services include road and footpath maintenance, animal registration and control, waste management collection, landfill management, public cemeteries and toilets, the provision and maintenance of sporting and recreation facilities and the start of the Alice Solar City project.

Revenue for 2007/2008 was raised from rates and annual charges, fees and charges, interest, grants and other revenue. Rates and annual charges increased by 10% from \$12.07m to \$13.33m. Grants and contributions increased from \$3.81m in 2006/2007 to \$7.3m in 2007/2008 reflecting the receipt of \$1.3m for the Alice Solar City project and a further \$1.5m to add to funding previously received for the improvements to the Aquatic & Leisure Centre.

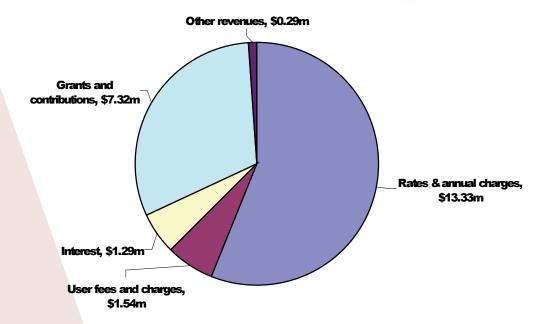
Expenses have increased by 3% from \$20.58m to \$21.20m mainly as a result of increases in salary and wage expenditure.

Revenue Breakdown



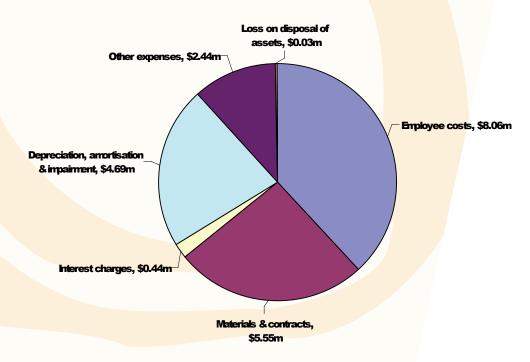

Council's financial position at the end of the year shows that it is in a reasonable financial position and that it has carried out its core functions as required and provided additional planned expenditure to enhance the quality of life within the community of Alice Springs. Where Council has an obligation to carry out specific work as a condition of grant funding and that work has not yet been completed provision has been made to ensure that funds are carried forward into the next financial year.

Council continues to set aside reserve funds to meet future requirements and these are specifically set out in the detailed financial statements. Not all long term obligations, such as depreciation, are cash funded as Council does not have the cash resources to do so at this time but, where possible, cash provisions have been increased out of cash held at the end of the financial year.

Note 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial report are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

1.1 Compliance with Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) as they apply to not-for-profit entities, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations (UIGs) and relevant Northern Territory Legislation.

1.2 Compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards

AIFRS include certain specific provisions relating to not-for-profit entities that are not included in the International Financial Reporting Standards. In addition, Australian Accounting Standard AAS 27 Financial Reporting by Local Governments also applies. Except to the extent that these special provisions require, these financial statements comply with International Financial Reporting Standards.

1.3 Historical Cost Convention

Except where stated below, these financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention.

1.4 Critical Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with AIFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates, and requires management to exercise its judgement in applying Council's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are specifically referred to in the relevant sections of this Note.

2 The Local Government Reporting Entity

Alice Springs Town Council is incorporated under the NT Local Government Act as amended and has its principal place of business on Todd Street, Alice Springs. These financial statements include the consolidated fund and all entities through which Council controls resources to carry on its functions. In the process of reporting on the Council as a single unit, all transactions and balances between activity areas and controlled entities have been eliminated.

Notes to and Forming Part of the General Purpose Financial Statements for the year ended 30th June 2008

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

3 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue is recognised when the Council obtains control over the assets comprising the revenue, or when the amount due constitutes an enforceable debt, whichever occurs first.

Where grants, contributions and donations recognised as revenues during the reporting period were obtained on the condition that they be expended in a particular manner or used over a particular period, and those conditions were undischarged as at the reporting date, the amounts subject to those undischarged conditions are disclosed in these notes. Also, disclosed is the amount of grants, contributions and receivables recognised as revenues in a previous reporting period which were obtained in respect of the Council's operations for the current reporting period.

4 Cash Assets and Other Financial Instruments

Cash Assets include all amounts readily convertible to cash on hand at Council's option with an insignificant risk of changes in value with a maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

Receivables for rates and annual charges are secured over the subject land, and bear interest at rates determined in accordance with the Local Government Act 1993 (as amended) and the Regulations and Determinations made thereunder. Other receivables are generally unsecured and do not bear interest. All receivables are reviewed as at the reporting date and adequate allowance made for amounts the receipt of which is considered doubtful.

All financial instruments are recognised at fair value at the date of recognition.

5 Inventories

Inventories held in respect of stores have been valued by using the weighted average cost on a continual basis, after adjustment for loss of service potential. Inventories held in respect of business undertakings have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

6 Property, Plant & Equipment

6.1 Transitional Provisions

At its meeting of 30th June 2008, Council elected to continue not to recognise land under roads, acquired before 30th June 2008, in accordance with the provisions of section 8 of AASB 1051 Land Under Roads.

All non-current assets purposed or constructed are capitalised as the expenditure is incurred and depreciated as soon as the asset is held "ready for use".

Notes to and Forming Part of the General Purpose Financial Statements for the year ended 30th June 2008

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

6.2 Materiality

Assets with an economic life in excess of one year are only capitalised where the cost of acquisition exceeds materiality thresholds established by Council for each type of asset. In determining (and in annually reviewing) such thresholds, regard is had to the nature of the asset and its estimated service life. Capitalisation thresholds applied during the year under review are as follows:

6.3 Valuation

Existing valuations, methods and values are detailed below. Assets brought to account for the first time are valued at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets are revalued every 3 to 5 years.

6.3.1 Land - Council owned and Council controlled

Freehold land and land over which Council has control, but does not have title, was valued by the Australian Valuation Office on the basis of fair market value on the 1st July 2006 and is disclosed at fair value.

6.3.2 Buildings / Furniture & Office Equipment / Plant & Equipment / - Sealed Roads / - Unsealed Roads / - Stormwater Drainage / - Other Infrastructure

These assets were valued by the Australian Valuation Office on 1st July 2004 and pursuant to Council's election are disclosed at fair value. All acquisitions since revaluation are recorded at cost.

6.3.4 Art Collection & Heritage

The Art Collection was valued by Mr William Mora, an independent valuer, on 1st July 2004 and pursuant to Council's election is disclosed at fair value. All acquisitions since revaluation are recorded at cost.

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

6.4 Depreciation of Non-Current Assets

Other than Land and Art Collection & Heritage, all Property, Plant and Equipment assets recognised are systematically depreciated over their useful lives in a manner which reflects the consumption of the service potential embodied in those assets.

Depreciation is recognised on a straight-line basis. Major depreciation periods for each class of asset are as follows:

Major Depreciation Periods
10 - 25 years
20 - 50 years
10 - 20 years
5 - 20 years
40 - 50 years
10 - 25 years
50 - 100 years
10 - 25 years

Depreciation periods for infrastructure assets have been estimated based on the best information available to Council, but appropriate records covering the entire life cycle of these assets are not available, and extreme care should be used in interpreting financial information based on these estimates.

6.5 Impairment

Assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to depreciation and are reviewed annually for impairment. Assets that are subject to depreciation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount (which is the higher of the present value of future cash outflows or value in use).

For assets whose future economic benefits are not dependent on the ability to generate cash flows, and where the future economic benefits would be replaced if Council were deprived thereof, the *value in use* is the depreciated replacement cost. In assessing impairment for these assets, a rebuttable assumption is made that the current replacement cost exceeds the original cost of acquisition.

7 Payables

7.1 Goods & Services

Creditors are amounts due to external parties for the supply of goods and services and are recognised as liabilities when the goods and services are received. Creditors are normally paid 30 days after the month of invoice. No interest is payable on these amounts.

7.2 Payments Received in Advance & Deposits

Amounts received from external parties in advance of service delivery, and security deposits held against possible damage to Council assets, are recognised as liabilities until the service is delivered or damage reinstated, or the amount is refunded as the case may be.

8 Borrowings

Borrowings are carried at their principal amounts which represent the present value of future cash flows associated with servicing the debt.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities to the extent that they are payable within 12 months and as non-current liabilities where Council has the right to defer payment beyond 12 months from the reporting date.

9 Employee Benefits

9.1 Salaries, Wages & Compensated Absences

Liabilities for employees' entitlements to salaries, wages and compensated absences expected to be paid or settled within 12 months of the reporting date are accrued at nominal amounts (including payroll based oncosts) measured in accordance with AASB119 Employee Benefits.

Liabilities for employee benefits not expected to be paid or settled within 12 months are measured as the present value of the estimated future cash outflows (including payroll based on-costs) to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Present values are calculated using government guaranteed securities rates with similar maturity terms.

No accrual is made for sick leave as Council experience indicates that, on average, sick leave taken in each reporting period is less than the entitlement accruing in that period, and this experience is expected to recur in future reporting periods. Council does not make payment for untaken sick leave.

9.2 Superannuation

The Council makes employer superannuation contributions in respect of its employees to the Local Government Superannuation Scheme. Whilst the Scheme has two different types of membership, each of which is funded differently, the Council only pays into members under the following scheme.

Accumulation Fund Members

The accumulation fund receives both employer and employee contributions on a progressive basis. Employer contributions are normally based on a fixed percentage of employee earnings in accordance with Superannuation Guarantee Legislation (9% in 2007/08; 9% in 2006/07). No further liability accrues to the employer as the superannuation benefits accruing to employees are represented by their share of the net assets of the Fund.

In accordance with part 8 of UIG Interpretation 1 Changes in Existing Decommissioning, Restoration and Similar Liabilities the increase in liability due to the passage of time (the unwinding of the discount related to the time value of money) is recognised to profit or loss as a finance cost as it occurs.

The liability is expected to be settled in approximately 15 years and is measured as the present value of the estimated future cash outflow. Present values are calculated using government guaranteed securities rates with similar maturity terms.
